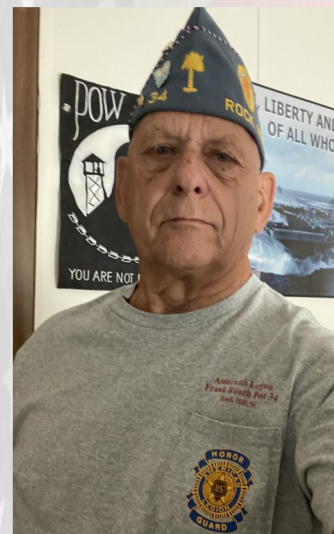

On Saturday, June 6, Stanislav received a letter from President Donald J. Trump, congratulating Stanislav on his upcoming birthday.

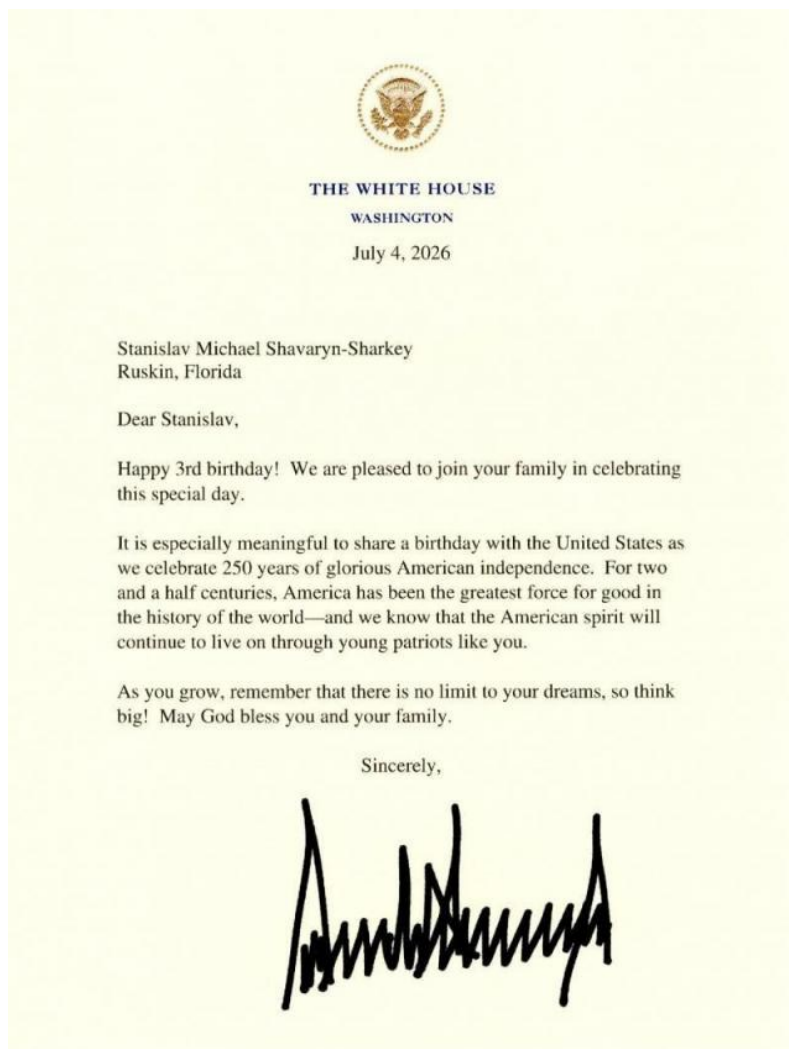
It is rare for the White House and Executive Office to issue a birthday greeting to a 3-year-old toddler.

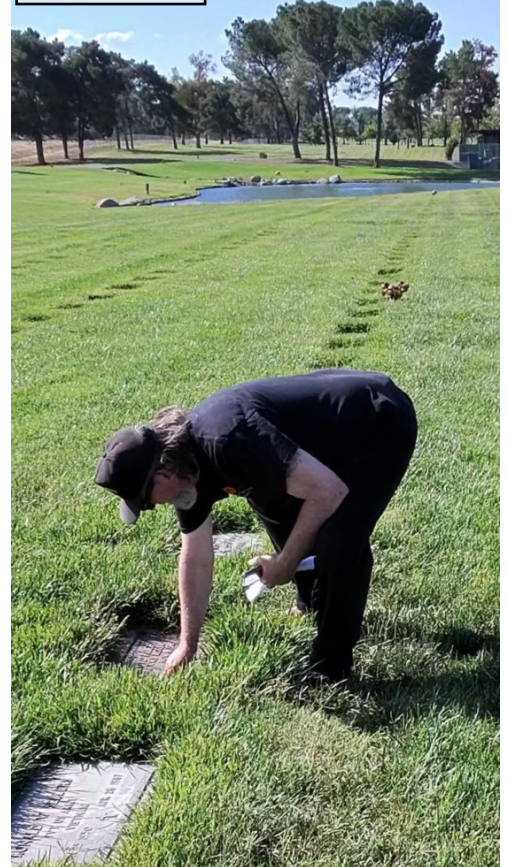

CA: What Do Different Coins on the Gravestone Mean?

My father, a Merchant Marine from WWII), and my mother are buried at Riverside National Cemetery. Afterward visiting them, I visited other veterans I know here. I had a bag of coins, and I was asked about the meaning.

What Do Different Coins on the Gravestone Mean?

The type of coin left on a gravestone has a specific meaning, personalizing the act and making it even more meaningful.

- **The Penny:** Leaving a penny on a deceased servicemember's tombstone means you visited their grave.
- **The Nickel:** Leaving a nickel indicates you attended boot camp together.
- **The Dime:** Leaving a dime means you served together in some way.
- **The Quarter:** A quarter is one of the most meaningful coins since it indicates that you were there when the servicemember died.

WI: SAL Member joins Post 375 Honor Guard

The American Legion Honor Guard is a unit of men and women veterans who pride themselves in dedication of honoring our deceased with complete military honors. The Honor Guard Unit also participates in ceremonies where a 21-gun salute is rendered. Often, the Honor Guard Unit includes a Color Guard. The "Color Guard" presents the colors at various public events such as parades, veteran functions, school activities, and patriotic programs. The Color Guard may be as simple as carrying the American, POW/MIA, and Legion flags. A rifle escort is always included for the American flag.

Two Honor Guard members may fold the American flag during a funeral ceremony. An Honor Guard member may play Taps using the electronic bugle. Prior to the service, the bugle will be checked to ensure the batteries are good. The member will take a position as appropriate to the location of the service. Taps will be played after the three round volley.

Flag precedence in both static displays and marching formations are in accordance with regulations outlined in various Legion and Military documents. The proper order in a line formation is viewing from left to right, a Lead Guard (LG), the U.S. Flag bearer and Color Guard Sergeant (CSG), Subordinate flag bearers (Sub) and the Trail Guard (TG). The line formation will be at close interval

(shoulder to shoulder). The column formation follows the same order as the line formation from beginning to end.

The Honor Guard must present a professional and dignified presence at these events.

Sons of The American Legion do have their own "Honor Guard" units as well. SAL members do present themselves as professional unit. Many American Legions Posts are accepting SAL members to become members Honor Guard members. The veteran mem-

bers have the opportunity to mentor the SAL members on the various protocols of being a Honor Guard member.

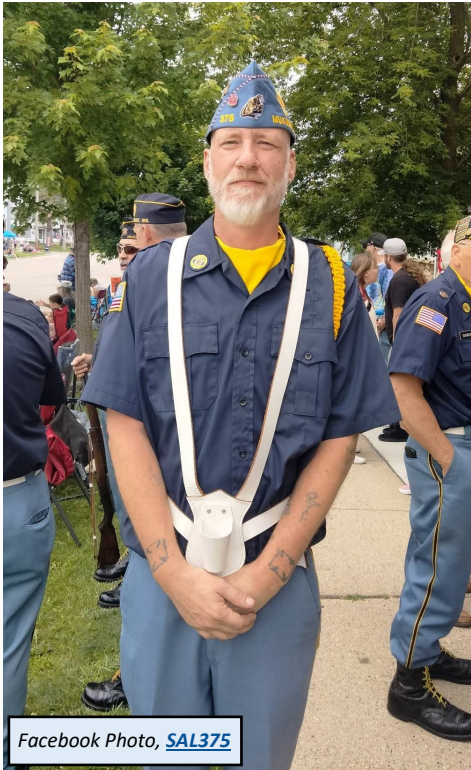

At the Father's Day Parade in June, Shawn was a part of the Color Guard at the very beginning of the parade. Detachment of WI NEC Chris Sherman has been a part his Post Honor Guard unit for 8 years. He was the first Squadron 71 member to join the unit. Now, 3 more SAL 71

members have joined the ranks.. TAL Post 71 presents the "Colors" at all sorts of events and sports events around the Milwaukee, WI. area.

Leigh Rainer was the first SAL 449 to join the American Legion Post 449 Honor Guard ten years ago. When the elite Squadron 449 SAL Color Guard Unit disbanded, Leigh wanted to continue his service.

Being a member of the Honor Guard Drill Team and Color Guard has many rewards that are difficult to put into words.

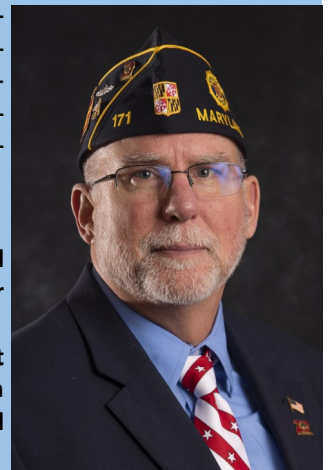

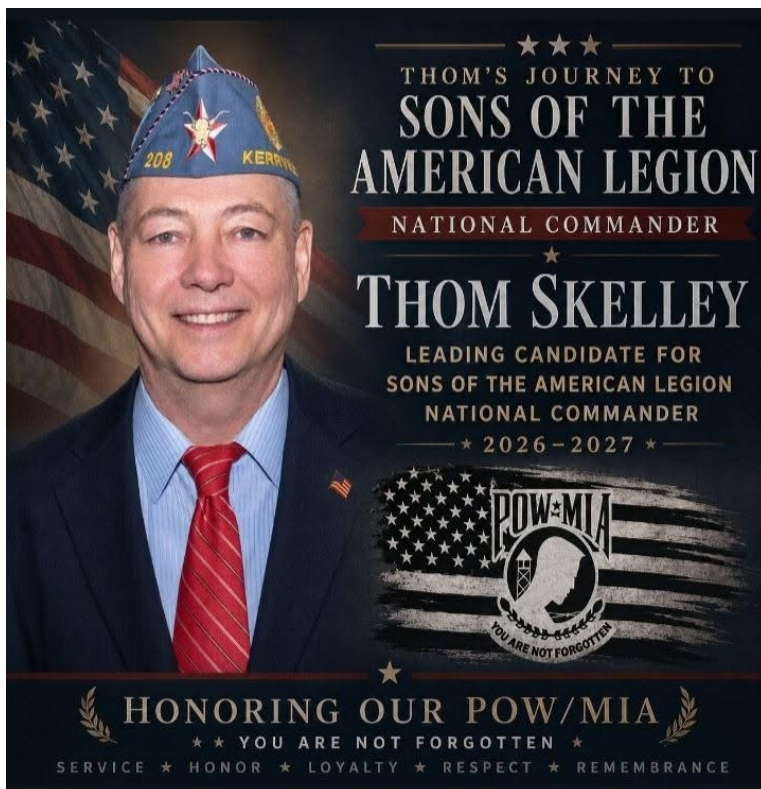

Butch's Bullet Points

June is known for many things, but most importantly for members of The American Legion Family, it is a reason to pause and remember one of history's most significant events.

Eighty-two years ago, on June 6, 1944, the world saw one of the greatest demonstrations of courage, commitment, and sacrifice in human history. D-Day—the Allied invasion of Normandy—marking the beginning of the end of World War II in Europe. The outcome was far from certain. Thousands of young Americans stepped from landing craft into battle, knowing that many would never return home.

What carried them forward was not a guarantee of success. It was a commitment to a cause greater than themselves.

On the sands of Normandy's beaches, American and allied soldiers fought through seemingly impossible odds. Among them was Edward Hall, grandfather of Past National Commander JR Hall, who served as a rifleman with the 115th Infantry Regiment. Like thousands of others that day, he faced relentless enemy fire, uncertainty, and danger, yet pressed forward because the mission demanded it.

Also landing at Omaha Beach was Howard Schlitter, grandfather of National Commander candidate Mike Monserud. Serving with the 942nd Field Artillery Unit, he was part of the immense force that provided critical support to the assault on Nazi-occupied Europe. He was wounded in the hedge rows on the 2nd day and spent the rest of the war recovering from his wounds, but his service reminds us that victory was achieved not only by those at the front of the charge but also by those who faithfully performed their duties under extraordinary circumstances day after day.

My best friend's father, William "Bud" Beck, was the pilot of LST #1. He and his crew landed members of the British 50th Infantry Division on Gold beach in what he called a "Long Slow Target" (LST). He feared that they would be caught on the beach at low tide and become sitting ducks. LST 1 made many trips that day and I only knew him to be a conductor on the Illinois Central

(AMTRAK) railroad. Another member of the Greatest (and quiet) Generation.

Just a few miles away, another remarkable story of determination unfolded at Pointe du Hoc. There, U.S. Army Rangers scaled 100-foot cliffs under enemy fire to silence German artillery positions threatening the invasion beaches below. They climbed ropes, ladders, and sheer rock faces while bullets and explosives rained down around them. Many fell. Many never reached the top. Yet those who survived pressed on and completed their mission. Their success helped secure the foothold that would eventually liberate Europe.

The lessons of D-Day remain as powerful today as they were in 1944.

Victory was not achieved by wishing for success. It was achieved through commitment, sacrifice, persistence, and follow-through. Every soldier had a role. Every unit had a responsibility. Every individual understood that the mission mattered.

The Sons of The American Legion face a different challenge today, but one rooted in the same spirit of commitment. Our mission is not fought on beaches or battlefields. It is fought through service, mentorship, patriotism, and the continued growth of our organization. Every membership card we secure strengthens our ability to support veterans, serve our communities, educate our youth, and preserve the legacy of those who served.

Our membership goal is more than a num-

ber. It is a promise.

It is a promise to honor men like Edward Hall and Howard Schlitter. It is a promise to remember Buddy Beck and the Rangers who climbed the cliffs at Pointe du Hoc. Most importantly, it is a promise to honor the thousands of Americans who never came home from Normandy and countless others who paid the ultimate price defending freedom throughout our nation's history.

Those heroes completed their mission despite enormous obstacles. The question before us is simple: Will we complete ours?

Every member who renews. Every member who recruits a new Son. Every squadron that reaches out to inactive members. Every volunteer who shares the story of the Sons of The American Legion helps move us closer to the goal.

The soldiers of D-Day understood that success required action. They climbed into landing craft, crossed the English Channel, stormed the beaches, and advanced inland because freedom depended upon it.

Today, our responsibility is to carry forward the legacy they entrusted to us.

As we work toward achieving our membership goal, let us remember the courage displayed on the beaches of Normandy 82 years ago. Let us match their determination with our own commitment. Let us honor their sacrifice through our service.

And let us finish the mission.

TX: "What's in a Name?"

Ever visit or drive by an American Legion Post and wonder who it was named after and why? Me too! Here are a few more I have dug up information on. Happy reading!

Edward H. White II American Legion Post #521, Pasadena Texas

The American Legion Post 521, located in Pasadena, Texas, was established in 1967 and proudly bears the name of Astronaut Edward H. White II—a pioneer in American space exploration, and a symbol of dedication, service, and sacrifice.

Astronaut Edward H. White II, born in San Antonio, became the first American to step outside his spacecraft and let go, effectively setting himself adrift in the zero gravity of space. For 23 minutes, White floated and maneuvered himself around the Gemini spacecraft while logging 6500 miles during his orbital stroll. White was attached to the spacecraft by a 25-foot umbilical line and a 23-ft. tether line; both wrapped in gold tape to form one cord. In his right-hand White carried a Handheld Self Maneuvering Unit (HHSMU) which was used to move about the weightless environment of space. The visor of his helmet was gold-plated to protect him from the unfiltered rays of the sun. Tragically, Ed White died on January 27, 1967, when Apollo 1 caught fire atop its Saturn 1B booster on Launch Pad 34 at Cape Kennedy."

Post 521 is committed to honoring those who served in the U.S. Armed Forces and supporting local communities. The post stands as a living tribute to the values of duty and patriotism, reflecting the spirit of Ed White, who was not only a decorated Air Force officer but also a trailblazer who embodied a lifelong passion for flying and service to his country.

American Legion Post 521 is notable for its display of a restored F4D Phantom jet, and is also the Post home of The American Legion Auxiliary's Past National President Carlene Ashworth.

A New Brand for the Next Era: For over a century, The American Legion has been nobly and ably represented by its 1919-patented emblem. As we look to the next era of The American Legion, the time has come for new brand marks to be used in all marketing communications applications. This also includes new marks for the American Legion Family and program brands.

The new brand marks do not replace the emblems. Instead, the emblems and the brand marks alike are to be used in specific applications that will better serve The American Legion going forward.



Brand Mark Options



Marketing, recruiting, & fundraising uses, such as:

- advertising
- apparel (use word mark for embroidery)
- business cards, letterhead, email signatures
- credentials, event badges
- press releases
- digital (apps, web, social, PowerPoint presentations)
- promotional communications (flyers, handouts, etc.)
- events (signs, backdrops, tents, tablecloths, swag/giveaways)

SAL Emblem



Official, legal, & historical uses, such as:

- uniform caps
- financial documents
- history books
- flags
- legal affairs
- internal manuals & guides
- reports & resolutions
- awards (option emblem or brand)
- building signage (option emblem or brand)
- formal government communications (option emblem or brand)

The emblem cannot be superimposed on anything other than a solid color—we had the emblem pasted on top of an American Flag graphic. We mention this as a "teachable moment." FL: Squadron hosts post-traumatic stress disorder awareness dinner

Sons of The American Legion Squadron 189 in Sebastian, Fla., has made it a regular occurrence to not only support the veterans at Post 189 and in its community, but to honor them as well. This has included Vietnam Veterans Welcome Home nights, honoring Purple Heart recipients and remembering prisoners of war and those still missing in action.



But on June 26, rather than honoring those veterans, Squadron 189 decided to help educate them on a condition that can often be tied into veteran suicide: post-traumatic stress disorder. And in doing so, it also was a night to remind those in attendance about the Legion's Be the One veteran suicide prevention mission.

As PTSD Awareness Month came to a close, Squadron 189 hosted a dinner that included guest speaker Michelle L. Auton, a veteran service officer for Indian River County. Auton served in the U.S. Army from 1989 to 1993, where she said she developed PTSD that led to alcoholism. She now is two years sober and was able to share her recovery with those in attendance at Post 189.

"June was PTSD Awareness Month. We're always looking for some idea to do something we haven't done before," said Peter Puzzo, a past commander of Squadron 189 who now serves as chairman of the Detachment of Florida's Membership Development & Training Committee.

"One of our pillars is Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation, and this falls directly into that, as well as with Be the One. And I think we miss the big picture by not doing things like this."

Auton, who is American Legion-accredited, shared how important it is to have discussions about mental health. "The biggest thing I can do to assist a veteran is listen, especially when they're opening up about mental health," she said. "A lot of people don't talk about mental health. There's been

such a stigma for so long, especially with men. Men don't allow themselves to be vulnerable. Giving them the space to do that and feel comfortable doing that – it's a safe environment. And we're actively listening. Letting them express their feelings, and then how do we navigate the outside civilian world and the VA system and getting them the help that they need.

"It's educating people on what does PTSD look like. What does anxiety look like. What type of physical symptoms your body might go through due to your mental health, and maybe you recognize those symptoms."

Auton said it was important to make those in attendance aware of their importance if they recognize someone who may be experienc-

ing a mental health crisis. "You could be that lifeline," she said. "That one phone call that you answer that could save somebody, and you may not even realize it."

Getting an opportunity to share her message to those at Post 189 that night – including about her own struggles – is important to Auton.

"It feels empowering that I ... have gotten to a point in my own recovery success to where I am able to share that and make that impact for others," she said. "Because people made an impact for me by sharing their stories. If I can impact one life positively, that's pretty empowering."

Puzzo said he feels Auton made that impact at Post 189. "I always try to watch the crowd during whatever event we're having," he said. "In this case, after she finished talking, I could see a different look in people's eyes. Many of them – veterans and spouses of veterans – they came up to me later on thanked me because someone is finally talking about it."

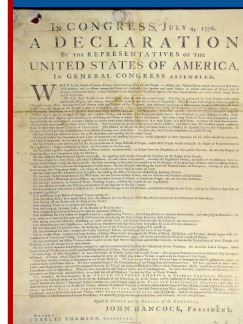
